Picnic Place and Mountain Drives Feature Peru Forest

Lookout Tower Will Cap Garnet Peak, 2200- Foot Crown of State Reservation-1500-Acre Acquisition and Development of Game Preserve With Three Big Ponds! Considered.

One of the loveliest little picnic grounds made by CCC workers in all of Berkhire County's many thousand acres of State forest and park land is at Peru, right beside the macadam between Hinsdale and Middlefield. Three thousand persons visited the charming sons visited the charming little spot last year and this year's use of the area has started proportionately larger, with several large groups holding outings there.

Two tiny ponds feature the area, fed by a sparkling meadow brook that dips into the little grove of stately

the little grove of stately hemlocks. Very little landscaping has been done, only clearing of undergrowth and lower tree branches and a general cleaning up of the grounds. Thus the natural beauty of the little woods is retained and improved upon.

Accommodations Comfortable

Sturdy picnic tables and benches have been provided and still addi-tional ones are ordered. Several of the simple but efficient little stone fireplaces for outdoor cooking have been built near the brook. Iron grating, fixed in the stones makes brolling easy. Generous stacks of wood cut the right length are four beside the fireplaces.


Larger of the two ponds is the upper one, built first. This has an attractive 30-foot cascade stone dam. The boulders used in constructing the dam were arranged in tumbled form so that the water splashes over it like a brook cascade. It is just big enough for 10 or 12 to use.

this became known the clean-out gate was opened and the trout allowed to go downstream into the brook outside the State's property. Consequently the brook has provided extraordinarily good fishing this summer.

Roads, Forest Developed

All the other work on the reserva-tion has consisted of road-building and forestry work. About two niles of excellent rock-base, gravel road has been constructed on the mountainside north of the Middlefield Road, where all the State's 2000 acres of mountain and plateau land lies. Several additional miles of road are planned, including three branches off the present route, all connecting with scenic Lafayette macadam motoring trail through Peru village to Worthington and Huntington Also, an additional mile of new road will be constructed on the south side of the mountain, off Middlefield Road, circling the top of Garnet peak, the 2200-foot highest eminence on the and Joining the present road on the northwest side of the mountain,

The roads, besides providing additional scenic drives, also are de-strable from the standpoint of fire this purpose are plotted throughout the reservation, although no work has been done on these as yet,

Game Preserve Talked

All the work done in the present forest will be insignificant compared with what is planned in a tentative program suggested by Superintendent Robert W. Brown-Ing.
This plan involves buying 1500

acres on the south side of Middlefield Road. In this area are three dried-up pond beds, Goose Pond, Jasenti Pond and Factory Pond. The whole area is drained by Factory Brook. There is valuable tim-ber on the land in discussion and the whole area is an important potential public game preserve, Under Mr. Browning's plan the three former ponds would be re-

stored, representing a very worth-while further contribution to the State's recreational facilities in the county. Factory Brook is an ex-cellent tront stream and the three potential ponds could be well stocked with fish for the public to enjoy forever.

All this would lit in nicely with the general character of the Peru forest, which is not being developed intensively as a park area but as a forested property. One is to eliminate the CCC camp allogether, calling the development a complete of job for the present. Another is to make the camp a regional automobile truck repair depot. Still others call for use of the camp as a base for travelling crews such as the disease control gang. Again, the camp may be retained and extensive further work done. Nobody knows. This would seem wise, because facilities for public use on the property are still meagre com and with the other State forests in the county.
